Resurrection: An Unfinished Story

hat do the following have in common... the Sagrada Familia Cathedral in
Barcelona; Leonardo da Vinci's painting of the Last Supper,
Schubert's Eighth Symphony and William Golding's novel
'The Paper Men'? The answer is one way or another, they are all unfinished!



What is known as 'the original ending' of St Mark's account of Jesus' resurrection appears to be similarly unfinished. His emphasis is on the very human responses of the women to an event that overwhelmed them. They'd seen for themselves how Joseph rolled the stone over the entrance, but when they arrive at the tomb, the stone has gone.

News of Jesus' resurrection and instructions about what to do next are given by an angel; not surprisingly the women are described as being 'alarmed' - an understatement if ever there was one! Their terror and confusion understandably gets the better of them: 'Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.' (Mark 16: 8).

If that was the women's initial response, we know from the other Gospels they quickly became the first evangelists to the male disciples who were in hiding: 'Brothers, we have seen the Lord: Jesus is alive!' We may never know if this unfinished ending is how Mark intended his Gospel to end, and scholars have argued about this for centuries! However, it strikes me that there's something significant which connects with those of us involved with the Scargill story.

It's one that starts in the 1950's, and has been documented in 'Miracle in the Dales' and 'My name shall be there'. When the doors closed in 2008, it looked as though the story might end there but, as we discovered, God had other plans. The remarkable story of the

years since is told in 'The Resurrection of Scargill', written for the 60th anniversary of our foundation in 2019. Fast forwarding to 2022, these last two years of the pandemic have in some very particular ways been an immensely challenging time for the community, and those of us who have responsibility as Trustees. Not to be able to welcome people to the house for 15 months, was deeply painful in a whole number of ways.

But adjustments have been made; an online programme began in the autumn of 2020 and continues to be a valued part of what we offer. And as a result of the extraordinary financial generosity of so many of you, along with your loving prayer support – for which we as Council and community are so grateful – the Scargill story goes on ...thank God it remains unfinished!

A bit like the women as Mark describes them, we've had our times recently of 'trembling and being bewildered' as we face fresh challenges, including recruiting new community members, and as we look to starting Phase 7 of the building development next year. But also like them, we have confidence in a faithful and powerful God, who's into resurrection! And we will go on sharing this hope-filled message, recognising that though we ourselves may be unfinished people, we will continue with our commitment to 'Lives shared; lives transformed, with Jesus at the centre'.

So now, may cynicism, despair and fear not abide!

n the past couple of years, if you wanted to cheer yourself up, you probably wouldn't turn on the news. Bulletins of Covid, climate change and the invasion of Ukraine have all been alarming and depressing. With so much bad news around for so long, it is hard to shake ourselves free from the inevitable sense of gloom that has pervaded our world, and we have to do a bit of digging in the scriptures to get our bearings again.

Recently I've landed on an extremely well-known scripture of St. Paul, which is so well-known that it is all too easy to skim over the surface of it and miss

the message. Here are his words: And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love (1 Cor.13:13). It would be wonderful if we could come to those words as if we were reading them for the first time to catch the power of them. Paul has elected three qualities that he clearly thinks are very important: faith, hope and love. Why did he select these three?

I sometimes wonder if it was because he saw their opposites so prevalent in the lives of the people to whom he was so diligent in preaching the gospel. For me, the opposites of these three would be cynicism, despair and fear. I'll be honest and admit that in the last couple of years I have experienced all of these.

Cynicism - the opposite of faith

I have chosen cynicism as the opposite of faith, because it seems that this is the most topical expression of no-faith. Without faith, it is quite natural to hold a very cynical view of life. But faith is that ability to see through things. We see a world in crisis, but we

also catch sight of a God at work in extraordinary and beautiful ways. Paul prayed that the Ephesians would develop an ability to see with the heart (Ephesians 1.18). If you read the rest of Ephesians 1, you will see that this kind of heart-sight enables us to see the world from the perspective of Christ risen from the dead and reigning gloriously above all things. I find such a vision does a very good job of rooting out cynicism.

Despair - the opposite of hope

The opposite of hope is despair, and there has been plenty of that around in the past couple of years. But of all the communities on Earth, the church is the one best placed to be a community of hope. I don't think that means we go around grinning at everybody and telling them we are giving thanks in all circumstances!

But I do think it is about leaning our weight on things other than external circumstances. 'Hope is the thing with feathers, that perches in the soul,' wrote Emily Dickinson, which is a beautiful image for this most precious quality of the soul. Hope is like a bird within us, that defies the gravitational pull of despair. Each of us has to do some work to discover our own quarries of hope – scriptures, inspiring stories, memories etc. Ultimately we hope because of the transformative power of Christ whose light no darkness can conquer.

Fear - the opposite of love

Some would see hatred as the opposite of love, but I can't get out of my mind those wonderful words of John, There is no fear in love, for perfect love drives out fear (1 John 4:18). I think many of us have felt a profound sense of fear in the face of the

death and deprivations caused by Covid, the alarming prognoses regarding the health of our planet, and the horrors and threats due to the invasion of Ukraine. But I am trying to learn a spiritual discipline of opening my heart in love whenever I feel afraid. When fear stalks my heart, I start to ask, 'Where can I show love?' There is no doubt, the warmth of love has a wonderful way of thawing the coldness of fear.

So may faith, hope and love be our pilgrim guides as we seek to follow Christ and witness to his vibrant life in a torn and troubled world.

'To see your face is like seeing the face of God'

s a Community we have been reading through Genesis in our morning praye



Genesis in our morning prayers. It has seemed to have taken for ever! Yet, it has been a rich and deepening experience of how God's love and purposes are worked out, even with the dysfunctional family dynamic through the generations.

The conflict between Esau and Jacob was foreseen even before their birth. Rebekah cries out in despair as she feels the struggle between them (Genesis 25 v22). The struggle is lived out: Jacob, truly living up to his name, deceives and tricks Isaac in giving him the blessing that rightly belonged to Esau. No love is lost between these two brothers with Jacob running for his life from Esau's murderous threats.

And then in the midst of all the ongoing family conflicts we have a beautiful moment of reconciliation between the two brothers (Genesis 33) where after greetings and generous exchanges Jacob says to his brother 'to see your face is like seeing the face of God'. The mysterious wrestling match the night before (Genesis 32 v22ff) surely was a life changing event for Jacob. It was a face to face encounter, upfront, sweaty and personal. Have a look at Jacob Epstein's sculpture of this encounter which is in the Tate Britain – they are right in each other's faces! Perhaps this encounter somehow opened Jacob up to see God's compassion in Esau's face the next day. It must have really surprised him.

Faces are wonderful and mysterious – they are filled with life. Life is imprinted onto our faces. Faces with years of laughter wrinkles, faces where pain that has left its mark with eyes that are dimmed – more than likely our faces are a mixture of both. Some faces are so hard to read – inscrutable. I find these faces rather unnerving, while other faces are so full of expression you know exactly what they are feeling! I love to see faces change while at Scargill, change from anxious to peaceful, from tense to smiling. At Scargill we try our very best to be open faced, and Dani one of our new Community members constantly reminds us to smile regularly. To be open faced though makes us vulnerable and that is a challenge for many of us.

Olivier Clément was a renowned Orthodox theologian who was converted by the face of a stranger whose face was so radiant and full of goodness. This encounter sent Clément on a journey that transformed his life into loving God and seeing Jesus in the face of others particularly those who faces that are not noticed, the faceless – the poor, the refugee (thinking of the millions fleeing Ukraine), and the downtrodden. It is a deep truth that God looks upon us with a face of compassion and the 'face' of God will turn up in surprising places. We live in a culture where people say hurtful things to one another without seeing their face, there is the movement to dehumanise those who are different, those we disagree with, those we might call 'enemies'. Social media has a dark side. Emmanuel Levinas, the Jewish philosopher, wrote something like 'if we truly recognise the face of another we cannot hurt them'.

Community life is 100% relational, it is face to face, and so it will be a cocktail of loving and frustration, laughter and irritation and more. It truly is an apprenticeship in discipleship learning through one another, and with the help of God, to be the face of Christ for each another; we are invited to be mindful of the quiet world that lives behind each face.

In the moving film Dead Man Walking (1995), which is set in Louisiana, there is a nun called Sister Helen Prejean who is asked to befriend a death row prisoner Matthew Poncelet. Sister Helen right at the end says to Matthew 'I want the last face you see in this world to be the face of love, so you look at me when they do this thing. I'll be the face of love for you.'

Risen Lord Jesus,
As Mary saw your face on that first Easter morning
So by your Spirit may we see your face of love where, mysteriously, agony and glory meet.
Let our faces radiate love, shining compassion to stranger and friend alike.
And stop us in our tracks to see your face in the other,
That we can say 'to see your face is like seeing the face of God...' Amen

Restoring the Soul

The physical approach to Scargill House is one which calms and restores the soul... gentle hills, a meandering river and the odd deer... on arrival, guests wind their way into the grounds of Scargill, up the road and luggage-bound, go through the door of the house... the bags are



soon carried by community members and volunteers as they unburden their guests.

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Hospitality is authentic, a mosaic of welcome in many forms: food glorious food, laughter, a firm ground of supportive prayer, restful comfy rooms, pianos, inviting chairs nestled by windows open to stunning views, a lovely gift shop, sitting rooms, log fires, a library, gardens and so on – a cornucopia of treasures! And taking time to walk in the grounds may lead guests to a stunning walled garden deeply cared for, a beautiful gentle labyrinth offering a space to reflect on life's pathways...

Scargill is a brave attempt at Christian community living, faith exploration, creativity, inclusive worship... it's an international place for all ages and all denominations; also some wonderful creatures grace it with their presence – not least, the birds! It's a lovely experience to sit in the warmth of the house and watch the many beautiful birds that can often be seen outside the house. The exquisite chapel sits in the landscape, its architecture like two hands in prayer and from within, a compelling space held by wood, glass, breath-taking views of nature. And on cold, winter days, there are even woollen blankets lovingly crafted to keep those who enter warm. So much of this chapel evokes the Christ-like welcome to all. Monastic, desert spirituality is present with a daily rhythm of prayer and silence, the worship is sensitively created, eclectic with new songs and old, contemporary imagery; a lightness, a depth and a dignity permeates the worship here. Underneath the vision of Scargill is the sheer hard work of the Community and volunteers – a discipline, a lightness of touch, humour.

Leading a retreat there is so enjoyable, a support network of organisation and attention to detail helping it all to run smoothly. I've led retreats on Ignatian spirituality, Advent, The Desert Mothers and in the future, retreats on Scripture and the Parables – this is a place that is theologically and spiritually open, a place of lively discussion where Christian Spirituality can be explored in an open, creative and respectful way. And it's a place with a vision, a deep sense of what it is, always looking forward at the same time. An experience of Scargill restores the soul and gives a real sense of Jesus' hope and promise, that he came so we can live life in all its fulness...



any of us can remember exactly where we were when lockdown was announced. I was at Scargill, taking part in a retreat for the trustees of ReSource and SOMA (Sharing of Ministries Abroad) being led by the Scargill community. It was a very special three days and I can remember thinking at the time that there was nowhere else I would rather be and no other bunch of people I would rather be praying with at a time of national crisis. We finished

our retreat but the open retreat being led by ReSource which was to start the day we finished had to be cancelled as Scargill was forced to close its doors to residential guests.

ReSource is one of our partner organisations and John Fell and myself have the privilege of being trustees of both. If you have been to Scargill in the last few months you may well have seen ReSource's newsletters in the sun lounge. The links between Scargill and ReSource actually go back far further than the last 3 or 4 years of our partnership. ReSource was founded in 2004 but it's roots go back to Anglican Renewal Ministries which began in 1981 as a result of a gathering of church leaders from the north of England at Scargill following the demise of the Fountain Trust. ReSource's strapline is "Alive in the Spirit and active in mission" and the particular focus of its ministry is to help 'little, local and ordinary churches' to engage with the Holy Spirit for renewal, discipleship and mission.

Although ReSource does organise Renewal Retreats and Quiet Days at Scargill and elsewhere, the main focus of its ministry is in the local church where a team of volunteer ReSource Ministers, of which Phil and I are a part, deliver bespoke days or parish weekends geared to the needs of a particular church or group of churches. Nancy, a recently appointed vicar in Chester diocese, was delighted that I was able to come recently and lead a Sanctuary Day for her church where there were 13 folk in the morning and 10 in the afternoon. We believe that the Lord loves the local church, no matter how small or struggling, and longs to bring new life through the power of his Spirit. As well as designing events for particular churches, ReSource is passionate about supporting clergy and lay leaders and has recently launched its Alongside Scheme to do just that. ReSource Companions offer prayerful support, companionship, listening and encouragement either in person or on-line through platforms like Zoom.

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Lesley, a Baptist Minister in Cardiff, comments, 'I can share openly in a safe space and receive wise counsel. It's good to talk and pray together.....We share the same sense of humour, so we do laugh a lot. I often come away with a different perspective on a situation I am facing. I always feel encouraged and strengthened.'

Christopher Landau, who became Director of ReSource last October, says this: 'We are so delighted by our growing partnership with Scargill. The House offers such a wonderful setting in which people can step away from the treadmill of daily life and find spiritual refreshment – and our experience of leading a ReSource retreat in late 2021 was hugely encouraging. People met with God in the deepest of ways, and it was precious for them to know that they did so in the context of the Community's ongoing life of prayer.' After what had been a few difficult months, four couples from our church were in need of encouragement, healing, refreshing and an opportunity to set aside time to seek God. We decided to approach Scargill to see if they could host us, or if there was any kind of programme that we could gatecrash at the last minute. So in hope, rather than expectation, we made the call. As usual God was ahead of us! A ReSource retreat was running in just a couple of weeks and there were four spare rooms and eight places still available. We booked!

Scargill never disappoints and just being there is part of the healing process, but to have the added opportunity of a guided retreat with worship, teaching, prayer and ministry was literally a 'God send'. The retreat was led by ReSource director Christopher Landau, trustee Felicity Lawson and Adrian and Esther Stone. The programme felt as though it had been tailor made for our needs and God moved gently yet powerfully, leading us towards healing and refreshment. The highlight of the course was on the final day when Phil Stone suggested to our little group we spent some time at the Wall of Lament, in the walled garden. Phil led us prayerfully through a time of outpouring of all the 'baggage' and burdens we had brought with us. Phil and Felicity's gentle ministry helped us to 'let go and let God'. We will never forget our encounter with the Holy Spirit in that place and also during the course sessions. We left for home later that afternoon significantly lighter in spiritual terms but perhaps a couple of pounds heavier after enjoying the wonderful food provided by the kitchen staff. Scargill is truly a wonderful place and mightily used by God.
